- Challenges in presenting MSC insights alongside quantitative data to donors was discussed. Stories bring meaning to numbers.

Overall Themes

- The MSC process itself being as valuable as the end results of story selection was emphasized by several participants.
- The need to customize MSC design and execution based on different organizational contexts and needs was highlighted.
